

See, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing floor. When he lies down, observe the place where he lies; then, go and uncover his feet and lie down; and he will tell you what to do." She said to her, "All that you tell me I will do." Hebrews 9:24-28

Lector A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.





Music Notes

Undine S. Moore (1902–1989) was a pioneering African American composer and music educator, known for her significant contributions to classical music and choral literature. Born in Chesterfield, Virginia, she showed early promise as a musician, studying piano and voice. Moore later attended the New York College for Teachers and earned a degree from Columbia University.

Moore wrote only two solo works for organ, and they are both based on hymn tunes. *Organ Variations on There is a Fountain*, 1979 has been lost. ⁴³ *Variations on Nettleton* ("Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing"), commissioned in 1976, offers our only example of Moore's work for this particular instrumentation. It is a short piece in the key of C major. It "begins with a variation based on the tune. The melodic line in the first variation is in the soprano voice and is accompanied by triplets in the left hand. A brief interlude follows, and the second and last variations present the melody in the pedal voice." The brief interlude consists of chromaticism on the manuals followed by a *forte* pedal entrance, which gradually diminishes to a *piano* with large leaps in the manuals and pedals. The last four measures—*Allargando e maestoso*—are chromatic and the piece ends with four distinct chromatic jazz chords. – Carol Ritter

The setting of the hymn tune 'Nettleton' by American organist and composer Aaron David Miller (b. 1972) is light-hearted and has a lilting rhythm. The tune is played on a reed in different registers with a light accompaniment. As is the case in many of his organ arrangements of hymn tunes, Miller includes a ritournello (refrain) that occurs in the beginning, middle, and at the end of the piece.

Writing about his own anthem, Caesar offers the following: "The anthem begins in solemn vein with the Psalmist's admonition for those engaged in the building trade and profession, but soon becomes a paean of praise on behalf of all those who worship the Lord. Later, the warning occurs once more before leading to the climax with the assurance of the Lord's blessing. The melody for this is the same as for the admonition, but now pitched a triumphant seventh interval higher, as if to proclaim that all is well with the building."

Anthony Caesar (1924 – 2018) was an English priest, organist and composer. Caesar was a boy chorister in the Winchester Cathedral Choir under Harold Rhodes, who directed choir rehearsals in the short street known as "Dome Alley", the title later on of one of Caesar's hymn tunes.

Dan Locklair (b. 1949) is an American composer and educator known for his contributions to contemporary classical music. Born on November 18, 1949, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, he has made significant impacts through his compositions that often blend traditional techniques with innovative ideas. Locklair's work spans various genres, including orchestral, choral, and chamber music.

Salem Sonata was commissioned in 2003 to celebrate the completed restoration of the historic 1800 David Tannenberg pipe organ that was originally installed and dedicated in 1800 in the Moravian Church in Salem, North Carolina. The fourth movement "(...Let His work your pleasure be...") is inspired by the hymn tune 'Almsgiving,' one of two hymn tunes sung at the last service in Home Church where the Tannenberg was played on 30 January 1910. Energetic and celebratory in nature, this movement brings Salem Sonata to a festive close. – Dan Locklair

Dear People of God in The Episcopal Church,

Early this morning, we learned that President Trump has been elected to another term as president of the United States. I pray that he will govern wisely and justly.

Regardless of our political allegiances, we must remember that God has called us in The Episcopal Church to seek and serve Christ in all persons. No matter the party in power, we are one church, and we will continue to fulfill our baptismal covenant by proclaiming in word and example the Good News of God in Christ, striving for justice and peace among all people, and protecting the dignity of every human being.

We commit to working with the new administration to advance policies that follow the teachings of Jesus by supporting the most vulnerable among us. Through Episcopal Migration Ministries, we abide by God's command to welcome the stranger, and since 1988, we have resettled more than 100,000 refugees through a bipartisan program with a strong record of success. We urge President Trump and members of Congress to exercise compassion toward the immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees we serve and to know that, at every turn, we will stand for the dignity and human rights of all of God's people.

We are Christians who support the dignity, safety, and equality of women and LGBTQ+ people as an expression of our faith. I pray that President Trump and his administration will do the same.

In the coming months, I ask us all to be agents of peace and reconciliation in our communities, both in person and online. As people of faith, we can work and pray for peace and unity among God's people whether we are joyful, hurting, or afraid. Especially now, when we know of efforts by domestic terrorists and foreign adversaries to undermine our trust in institutions and in one another, we can combat the misinformation and fear by which the Enemy seeks to divide us from one another.

I give thanks for all the ministries in dioceses and congregations across the church that are tangible expressions of our belief in a God of compassion and mercy. In every season, this is the work that God has set before us.

Dear friends in Christ -

Emotion is running high this morning. Some are elated, some in despair. Depending on one's close circle, there is either a sense that all is lost or that all has been reclaimed. Who is right and who is wrong is for history to decide.

What is not up for judgement is the sure and certain knowledge that God is God. God did not lose, nor did God win, in this election. God is victory, and life, and love simply because God is God. And through the saving power of the sacrificial love of Jesus, by the power of the Holy Spirit who walks our journey with us, we are born anew – every single day – into that victory, life, and love.

I am mindful at this moment of two passages of Holy Scripture. The first is the opening of the first chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, a portion of which is on the Church Calendar for today. Regardless of whether we voted for the victor or the defeated in this election, regardless of how the person we find ourself communicating with today voted, we must remember that we were all created by the One who was, and is, and is to come; that darkness cannot overcome the light of Christ Jesus; and that God's gift to us is always going to be grace upon grace.

The second passage of which I am mindful is the final section of Matthew 25. Now, more than ever, we need to recognize and live into one of the clearest things Jesus ever said about how we interact with others – that how we treat the impoverished, the imprisoned, the malnourished, the one who differs from us – that how we treat "the other" speaks directly to how we treat the God who is love. Every human being is a child of God, and loved by Jesus. Therefore, we can do no less. Whether we are elated this morning over this earthly thing called an election, or in despair over it. We can do no less.

Emotion is running high today, my friends. And yet, God is still God.

May that very same God bless and keep us all, this day and unto ages of ages.
