





THE HOLY GOSPEL John 6:1-21

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world." When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

G.F. Handel (1685-1759)

Music Notes

Composed in 1878, **César Franck**'s *Cantabile* is a brief gem for organ. Part of a three-movement set, it offers a moment of calm contemplation amidst the grandeur of the other pieces.

The music unfolds in three sections. A gentle melody, first presented in the high register, unfolds with a sense of peace. A central section offers a playful canon, with the melody imitated between the right hand and pedals. Finally, the opening theme returns, transformed and serene, offering a peaceful conclusion. **César Franck** (1822-1890) was a Belgian-French composer, organist, and teacher who left a lasting mark on French music.

Born a prodigy, Franck displayed exceptional talent at a young age. He began his musical journey in Belgium but found his true home in Paris. There, he became the organist at the famed Saint-Clotilde Basilica, a post he held for decades.

Franck's compositions embraced the Romantic era, blending French lyricism with the structural innovations of German composers like Beethoven and Wagner. While initially composing fewer works due to his organist duties, his later years saw a surge in creativity.

He became a revered professor at the Paris Conservatoire, influencing a generation of musicians like Vincent d'Indy and Gabriel Pierné. Today, Franck is remembered for his orchestral, chamber, and organ works, many of which have become staples of the classical repertoire.

Panis Angelicus (Latin for "Bread of Angels" or "Angelic Bread") is a setting of the penultimate strophe of the hymn *Sacris solemniis*, written by Saint Thomas Aquinas for the Feast of Corpus Christi. It is one of the most popular and well-known pieces of sacred music, and has been performed and recorded by countless artists.

Franck's setting of *Panis Angelicus* is originally for solo tenor, harp, cello, and organ. Today's version is for two-part choir and organ. It is a beautiful and moving piece of music, characterized by its soaring melody, rich harmonies, and deep spirituality. The music is expressive of the text, which speaks of the Eucharist as the "Bread of Angels" that comes down from heaven to nourish our souls.

The *Hornpipe* from **Handel**'s Water Music is a burst of energetic fun. Composed for a royal celebration on the River Thames, it injects a lively dance into the orchestral suite.

The Hornpipe is a specific type of jig, a lively folk dance with hopping steps. Handel captures this spirit perfectly with a bouncy melody and a fast tempo.

The music is simple yet effective, with a repeated rhythmic pattern that keeps the feet tapping. This short movement offers a delightful contrast to the other, more flowing sections of Water Music. It's a reminder of Handel's ability to entertain with both grandeur and lighthearted charm.

George Frideric Handel (1685-1759) was a German-born British composer who dominated the Baroque musical scene.

Born in Halle, Germany, Handel displayed musical talent at a young age. Despite his father's wishes for a different career path, Handel's passion for music prevailed. He honed his skills in Germany and Italy, absorbing the influences of both countries' musical styles.

Handel's career wasn't without challenges. He faced competition from other composers and financial difficulties. Yet, he remained a prolific composer, creating orchestral works like Water Music and Music for the Royal Fireworks, along with concertos, chamber music, and anthems.

By the time of his death in London in 1759, Handel was a revered and wealthy figure. He left behind a vast musical legacy, influencing generations of composers and securing his place as one of the Baroque era's greatest musical giants.
