



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST LESSON

Lector A reading from the Book of Proverbs.

Wisdom cries out in the street; in the squares she raises her voice. At the busiest corner she cries out; at the entrance of the city gates she speaks: "How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple? How long will scoffers delight in their scoffing and fools hate knowledge? Give heed to my reproof; I will pour out my thoughts to you; I will make my words known to you. Because I have called and you refused, have stretched out my hand and no one heeded, and because you have ignored all my counsel and would have none of my reproof, I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when panic strikes you, when panic strikes you like a storm, and your calamity comes like a whirlwind, when distress and anguish come upon you. Then they will call upon me, but I will not answer; they will seek me diligently, but will not find me. Because they hated knowledge and did not choose the fear of the Lord, would have none of my counsel, and despised all my reproof, therefore they shall eat the fruit of their way and be sated with their own devices. For waywardness kills the simple, and the complacency of fools destroys them; but those who listen to me will be secure and will live at ease, without dread of disaster."

THE SECOND LESSON

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue- a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

THE HOLY GOSPEL

And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him. SERMON

Silence is kept.

NICENE CREED We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.



Music Notes

Commissioned by the American organist Kenrick Mervine, Variations on 'Kelvingrove' was composed in 2014. The theme is harmonized simply, and six variations follow, the first of which is a kind of waltz with the theme appearing in the left hand. The second is a pedal solo and the third a very fast duo. Then follows a long Adagio on the celeste stops (supposed to sound like strings), and a brilliant toccata using repeated chords, after which the work ends with a loud and majestic grand chorus.

Denis Bédard is a renowned Canadian composer, primarily known for his organ works and choral pieces. Born in Quebec City in 1950, he studied music at the Conservatoire de musique de Québec and later pursued advanced studies in Europe. Bédard has composed a vast repertoire of works for organ, including solo pieces, duets, and compositions with other instruments. His music often blends traditional organ techniques with modern elements, creating a unique and captivating sound. In addition to his organ compositions, Bédard has also written for various ensembles and vocal groups, showcasing his versatility as a composer.

St. Richard (1197-1253) is associated with Chichester as he was the bishop there from 1244 until his death but, for us in Worcestershire, it is his birthplace near Droitwich that is more relevant. And, of course, the hospice in Worcester is named after him as St Richard's Hospice was originally founded in Droitwich in 1984. The words of this week's anthem are supposed to have been recited by him on his death bed, surrounded by clergy of the Chichester Diocese.

As I began to write this commentary, I knew that my knowledge of the composer, **L J White**, was nonexistent. However, thanks to Google, I have found out that Len was a deputy head. He was also the Choirmaster at St Andrews church in Willesden Green, North London, until his death in the 1970's. He composed other music, but A *Prayer of St Richard of Chichester* is the anthem for which he is remembered. Written in 1947, the anthem was originally composed for two treble parts but is easily adapted to two mixed parts. The beautiful shape of the main melody makes it very singable, yet it retains a simplicity that befits the words. And, when the words are sung for a second time, a descant is added; it sometimes collides with the main melody before finally rising above it.

John Knowles Paine (1839-1906) was a pioneer in American classical music, serving as a key figure in establishing a distinctive national voice in the genre. Born in Portland, Maine, in 1839, Paine studied music in Germany under renowned composers such as Carl Friedrich Wilhelm Weitzmann and Johannes Brahms. Upon his return to the United States, he became a professor of music at Harvard University, where he played a pivotal role in nurturing a new generation of American composers. Paine's compositions, which included symphonies, operas, and chamber music, showcased his talent for blending European influences with American folk elements. His work helped to elevate American classical music to international recognition and continues to be celebrated for its artistic value and historical significance.

John Knowles Paine's Concert Variations on an Austrian Hymn is a remarkable piece for organ that showcases his mastery of the instrument and his ability to blend intricate variations with a cohesive musical narrative. Composed in the late 19th century, this work is based on the melody of the Austrian national anthem and is the hymn tune of today's closing hymn. Paine's variations explore a range of moods and technical challenges, from lyrical passages to more complex, virtuosic sections. The piece is celebrated for its rich harmonic language and inventive use of the organ's capabilities, making it a favorite among organists and a staple in the concert repertoire. The Fugue is the last variation from the set and showcases the composer's skill at contrapuntal writing. The fugue subject hints at the well-known hymn tune, but it is not until the end of the variation that the tune proper emerges buttressed by thick loud chords.
