

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST LESSON Proverbs 31:10-31

Lector A reading from the Book of Proverbs.

A capable wife who can find? She is far more precious than jewels. The heart of her husband trusts in her, and he will have no lack of gain. She does him good, and not harm, all the days of her life. She seeks wool and flax, and works with willing hands. She is like the ships of the merchant, she brings her food from far away. She rises while it is still night and provides food for her household and tasks for her servant-girls. She considers a field and buys it; with the fruit of her hands she plants a vineyard. She girds herself with strength, and makes her arms strong. She perceives that her merchandise is profitable. Her lamp does not go out at night. She puts her hands to the distaff, and her hands hold the spindle. She opens her hand to the poor, and reaches out her hands to the needy. She is not afraid for her household when it snows, for all her household are clothed in crimson. She makes herself coverings; her clothing is fine linen and purple. Her husband is known in the city gates, taking his seat among the elders of the land. She makes linen garments and sells them; she supplies the merchant with sashes. Strength and dignity are her clothing, and she laughs at the time to come. She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the teaching of kindness is on her tongue. She looks well to the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness. Her children rise up and call her happy; her husband too, and he praises her: "Many women have done excellently, but you surpass them all." Charm is deceitful, and beauty is vain, but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. Give her a share in the fruit of her hands, and let her works praise her in the city gates.

For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace. Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures. Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you.







Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. Music Notes

Prelude in the form of a Minuet, Op. 88, No. 1 by Sir Charles Villiers Stanford is the first piece in his collection of six organ preludes, Op. 88, composed between 1903 and 19051. This prelude is characterized by its elegant and lyrical style, reflecting the traditional minuet dance form, which was popular in the Baroque and Classical periods. Written in E-flat major, the piece showcases Stanford's ability to blend classical forms with Romantic expressiveness, making it a charming and accessible work for organists1. The collection was published by Breitkopf & Härtel and remains a notable example of Stanford's contribution to organ music.

Sir Charles Villiers Stanford (1852–1924) was an influential Anglo-Irish composer, conductor, and music teacher of the late Romantic era. Born in Dublin, he was educated at the University of Cambridge and furthered his studies in Leipzig and Berlin. Stanford was a founding professor at the Royal College of Music and served as Professor of Music at Cambridge. He composed a wide range of works, including seven symphonies and numerous choral pieces, particularly for the Anglican Church. Despite his significant contributions to music, his fame was later overshadowed by his contemporaries and students, such as Edward Elgar, Gustav Holst, and Ralph Vaughan Williams.

Although well known as a free-standing anthem, O for a closer walk with God was originally designed to accompany (as an optional concluding statement) the last of Stanford's Six Bible Songs, Op 113, 'A Song of Wisdom'. Indeed, the anthem formed the last of Six Hymns each of which was based on a familiar hymn tune. The source of O for a closer walk with God was the Scottish Psalter (1635) with words by W Cowper allied with the old Psalm tune Caithness. Using three verses (1, 3 and 5) from the original five, Stanford shaped a chorale fantasia around the melody in which the intricacies of harmony, counterpoint, phrase-length, register and organ accompaniment are manipulated with increasing dexterity, particularly in the highly expressive final verse ('So shall my walk be close with God, Calm and serene my frame') with its combination of fervor and spiritual confidence.

Craig Phillips (b. 1961) is a distinguished American composer and organist, known for his significant contributions to choral and organ music. He serves as the Director of Music at All Saints' Church in Beverly Hills. Phillips' compositions are regularly performed in churches and cathedrals across the United States and internationally. His works have been featured in concerts throughout North America, Europe, and Asia. He has received numerous accolades, including being named the American Guild of Organists Distinguished Composer in 2012.

His arrangement of the tune "Lobe Den Herren" for organ features irregular meter throughout the piece. After a brief introduction, the tune is played on the Great division. Material from the introduction segways into the tune played in the pedals (feet) punctuated by repeated thick chords. The piece ends with a rousing pedal point and a harmonic twist before the resolution.
