A Season of Hope

From Mother Anne M. Turner *Rector*



Dear Friends in Christ,

The thing that I like most about Advent is also the thing that makes it most challenging: Advent begins with endings. With the end of the world, to be specific. Every year, on the first Sunday of Advent, the lessons speak of the stars falling from heaven, the unexpected hour of judgment and change.

I have a lot in my life that I want to let go of. I have a lot in life that I am afraid to let go of. And I know, in the end, that I cannot move on in life without letting go.

Advent is important for me this year because we at Grace are in a moment of letting go. Staff transition is the most obvious change. We have said goodbye to our Music Director and Associate Rector. We are preparing for Mother Emma's maternity leave. We are welcoming three interim positions: Music Director, Family Ministries Assistant, and (soon to be named) Associate Rector. We anticipate searches for permanent staff members beginning in the new year.

But staff transition is not the only change. Our world is in tumult, and we are constantly responding to that upheaval, whether through our outreach ministries, pastoral care, or worship life. We welcome newcomers every Sunday—a far happier change, but one that nonetheless makes demands of us.

I know that change can be hard. I know that it can be tiring. I also know that it keeps us alive.

The gospels teach about the end of the world not as a disaster but as a promise for transformation. The purpose of change is to open us more and more to God's future for us.

Crisis brings opportunity. It is a cliché but also true. In this moment of change, we can live intentionally into our mission as a place to love, proclaim, and serve God. We can be deliberate about making choices that align with our vision for the future.

The theme for this issue of Grace Notes is "A Season of Hope." Can we honestly say that we are living in a season of hope right now? I believe that the answer is yes. I understand that loss and anxiety are close at hand. But I also believe that sadness and fear draw us closer to Jesus. These difficult emotions encourage our dependency on Jesus. And when we draw close to Jesus, we find new intimacy with him.

In Luke's gospel, the response to the end of the world is this: "Stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." My friends, I hope your heads are high. God's future is seeking us out.

As I look back on my years at Grace, the story that keeps giving me language for what I have learned is the Christmas story. In true David Letterman fashion, here are Ten Things Grace Has Taught Me, told through the wonder of the Incarnation.

1. The Annunciation.

Gabriel came to Mary with world-shaking news. After fear and incredulity, she opened her heart with trust. You, Grace Church, have taught me to receive news - good and hard - with gratitude, hope, and a calm confidence that God is always at work. You are a graceful bunch, and I am forever grateful for your witness.

2. The Visitation.

Mary "went with haste" to Elizabeth, carrying both mystery and joy. You have shown me that pastoral care showing up, checking in, holding one another through fear and celebration - is one of the most beautiful ministries we share. And when we gather, blessings often overflow into song.

3. Joseph's Dream.

When disappointment clouded Joseph's heart, God revealed a deeper truth. Through your faithfulness in grief and uncertainty, you have taught me how to wait on God's loving plan when life surprises us.

4. The Manger.

The Word made flesh was cradled in loving arms. At Grace, I have learned again the sacredness of children - their joy, questions, and wonder. You have helped me cherish the child within me and celebrate the gift of childhood among us.

5. The Angels' Song.

Shepherds heard heaven break open in praise. At Grace, our worship, too, rings with meaning. We worship with the reverence of people who know God meets us here: "We take worship seriously, but we do not take ourselves too seriously."

6. The Shepherds' Journey to the Manger.

They came simply to behold what God had done. From you I have learned that ministry is not about control. The divine plan does not depend on me. I am a witness, a companion, a servant. Everything depends on God.

7. The Naming of Jesus.

The Holy Name carries power to heal and save. In this community, I have seen how turning to Jesus - honestly and vulnerably - transforms lives, softens hearts, and brings hope.

8. The Gifts of the Magi.

Your generosity - of time, talent, treasure, and spirit - has shaped me. You give sacrificially and with joy, and I am a grateful student of your example.

9. The Presentation in the Temple.

Mary and Joseph offered what they had. You have shown me that faith grows through steady, humble offerings: prayers, service, presence.

10. And finally - Christmas itself.

A story of grace and love. That is what I found at Grace Church. That is what you have given me. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart.

They were brought in to help clear the wooded area behind our playground, and they wasted no time getting started. As soon as the trailer opened, the animals eagerly began munching on the greenery.

Students had the chance to meet one of the goats up close and watch as Mr. Rojas and Ms.



This project is the first step in reimagining our outdoor space, inspired by the Grace mission of "honoring the gift of childhood" and by a desire to celebrate the natural beauty that surrounds us. We look forward to partnering with the church community as we bring this project to life in the months ahead.

Mary, the goats' owner, worked together to build a fence line to keep the animals (goats and a few sheep) safe while they're on duty.

During their time with us, the goats and sheep munched their way through the ivy, undergrowth, and understory of the wooded area. It was incredible to see how quickly they worked—revealing a few surprises, plenty of thorns, and even the potential for a winding pathway, a project we hope to bring to life this winter.








A Visit From St. Nicholas By LucyLee Reed

Many centuries before the poet Clement Moore moved the great Saint's visit to Christmas Eve, Saint Nicholas had his own special date: the 6th of December. He was so popular in the middle ages for his special interventions for children, brides, and sailors, and for his honesty and generosity that, reportedly, to this day more churches bear the name Nicholas than bear the name Mary!


Before we returned to Grace in 1988, we were involved with the movement back to the original Saint and date under the influence of the then Bishop for the Armed Forces. He always visited in Germany in early December to celebrate a Saint Nicholas Eucharist at one of the Episcopal churches.



David Crosby and Fr. Malm (date uncertain; possibly 1990?)


When the Chrismon event no longer was offered, Father Malm suggested moving the visit to Sunday morning services. A script was created incorporating blessings from "Prayers for the Domestic Church" by Father Edward Hayes, whose over-the-top print of Saint Nicholas is a favorite (picture to the right). Saint Nicholas always gives the children small red and white candy canes representing his staff and the body and blood of Christ, and holy cards.

When we came back here, Grace had started an intergenerational Chrismon event with an appearance from Santa Claus. (Chrismons are Christian symbols for Jesus Christ made into tree ornaments.) After Father Malm arrived, I proposed to him that we switch to a visit from Saint Nicholas. He agreed and, of course, we had our own red cope and mitre (bishops' vestments) to borrow from the Altar Guild, and a crook (shepherd's hook) we could borrow from the pageant supplies. (Once, a visiting bishop forgot his traveling crook and used the one we had in the sacristy for Nicholas!)




Many persons have depicted Saint Nicholas for us, beginning with David Crosby (who had been our Santa Claus before). Early on we had false beards available if needed, but for many years we have been blessed at Grace with many bearded aspirants for the post! Many of these looked very much like the icon.






A Stewardship Story Grace Church 1855–2125

In early November, Elizabeth Legere and Barry Joyner led a Sunday adult forum on the topic "Stewardship Funded our Start and Ensures our Future: Grace Church 1855-2125".

We discussed our parish's stewardship journey as having three distinct parts: honoring the past, shaping the present, and protecting the future. (Slides are shared online.)

In the history of our parish, Grace Church was planted in 1855 on South Patrick Street in Old Town. Did you know that land purchase and the building construction were all funded by individual donations? The parish spent 90 years at that location, and the first pledge campaign was conducted there after many years of disjointed contributions and vestry members paying parish bills.

In 1948, Grace Church was transplanted to Russell Road, to serve the booming neighborhoods that blossomed around here after World War II. Have you heard that many parishioners took second mortgages on their homes to build our church here? That's unusual and sacrificial giving!

If you're interested, the fabulous booklet in our parish library, "A History of Grace Episcopal Church, Alexandria, Virginia" is a wonderful read, with lots of details of our past, our firsts, and our historical facts.

Stewardship as shaping the present is most on our mind today, as we look ahead to funding the 2026 budget. Our pledge campaign each year funds 80% of our annual budget. Individuals lead "shaping the present" every year by volunteering, donating their skills, mentoring others, as well as making a pledge through our pledge campaign. We talked about the various parts of our spiritual lives and communal lives that call us to give back to God's creation, our parish, other people, and our community.

Have you visited the Stewardship page on our parish website? You'll find great resources there including how to give financially, how to pledge, how to pay your pledge, and logistical details on automatic bank payments, stock donations, making IRA gifts, and how to plan for the future through planned giving.

Lastly, we examined Stewardship in planning for the future. The 2025 Grace Church Vision Committee Report recently released to the parish shares our combined future vision for the parish and our core values.

As we move into living and planning that vision for the coming decade, the financial side of protecting the future is through planned giving. We spent quite a bit of time talking about the Grace Trust, overseen by our independent Grace Trust Board.

The Grace Trust is our parish's endowment that was started in 2000 as a savings account. Thanks to generous donations from living parish members and bequests of past parishioners, the balance is now over \$1.8 million, a step on our larger goal of an endowment that can provide supplemental income towards the care of our parish for many generations to come.

Our Vestry requests an annual disbursement from the Grace Trust to be used for capital acquisitions, major maintenance projects, or highly unique outreach opportunities. As the annual disbursement grows, more of the care and maintenance of our campus and building are assured for future generations.

We hope in the spring to have a more detailed adult forum on personal stewardship steps including life planning, making a will, funeral planning, and your own planned giving, including alerting the parish office when you include the Grace Trust or Grace Church in your will. Saying "Yes" Leads to Serenity and Hope

The hardest thing about saying yes to God is that it means accepting everything life puts in front of us. Most of us have a habit of going through our days saying no to the people and things we don't like, and yes to the people and things we do like. Yet everyone and everything we encounter IS our life. We may be afraid that if we say yes to the people and things we don't like, we will be stuck with them forever. That might or might not be true. But it's only through acknowledging the existence of everything and everyone in our life that we can begin the process of change. So saying yes doesn't mean indiscriminately accepting things that don't work for us. It means conversing with God and starting the conversation with a very powerful word — yes.

This brings to mind the Serenity Prayer: "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

When we say yes to God, we enter into a state of hope and trust that whatever our situation is, we can live and work with it. We can identify and try to accept what we cannot change, and then start trying to change the things we can. We express confidence in ourselves and the world around us, and we also express a willingness to learn from whatever comes our way, rather than running and hiding when we don't like what we see or hear. The question we might ask ourselves is, "What it will take for me to get to the point of saying yes?" For some of us, it takes coming up against something we can't ignore, escape, or deny, and so we are left with no choice but to say yes. For others, it just seems a natural progression of events that leads us to making the decision to say yes to life.

The first step to saying yes is realizing that, in the end, it is so much easier than the alternative. Once we understand this, we can begin examining the moments when we resist what is happening, and experiment with saying yes instead. It might be scary at first and even painful at times, but if we continue to say "Yes, I accept these things I cannot change," we will discover the joy and hope of moving on to positive and prayerful conversation with God about the things we actually can change through our response to them-by our words, our actions, or both. This might even include joining groups of people who hope to influence the kind of change that can't be accomplished by one person acting alone.


