Dear Friends in Christ,

Gathering meaningfully means this: "Committing to a bold, sharp purpose."

These words from Priya Parker's "*The Art of Gathering: How We Meet and Why It Matters*" came to mind as I thought about "Graceful Gathering," the theme of this issue of Grace Notes. We come together not just because we love each other or God (although we do, very much), but because we have reason to be together. Many of us return to parish life in September with renewed vigor because we feel the eagerness and anticipation of shared purpose. Now is the time that things are going to happen.

So, just what's happening? What's our purpose in gathering as a parish?

Our Visioning Team has recently completed its work. They presented their findings to the vestry in August. They then presented them to the parish in September, with a session at Shine Mont followed by three at Russell Road.

Their report is thoughtful, insightful, and filled with the Holy Spirit. They have identified six strands of mission—"golden threads" of our shared desires:

- * spiritual formation
- * institutional knowledge and communication
 - * generational engagement
- * bridges for Grace and La Gracia
 - * community and belonging
 - * neighborhood outreach

The team also identified the need to root these desires in sustainable programs and physical space.

The report describes a church that is engaging, faithful, and exciting. I want to belong to this church. I get to be a part of building this church. So do you.

I encourage you to learn more about this vision. It is our why. It is the reason we gather together and what we hope our shared life will accomplish. It is the compass we will use to figure out what is going to happen next.

The vestry is responsible for moving the vision forward, understanding what our resources are and what will be possible. But this vision came from the congregation as a whole and belongs to the congregation as a whole. You dreamed it. You get to make it real. I'm glad to gather together around this hope for our future.

On the Mind of Father Santiago



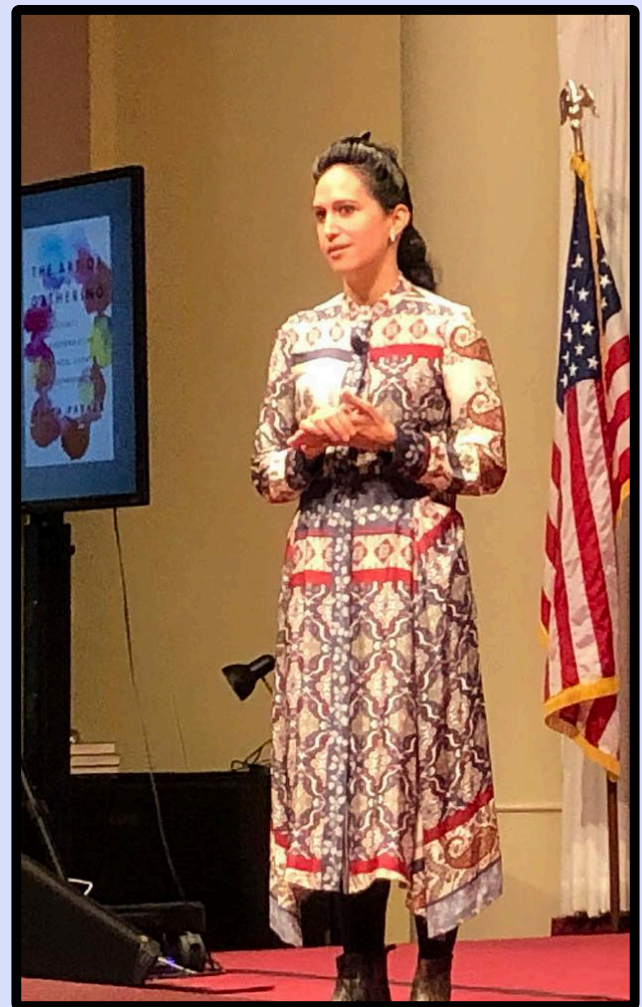

Priya Parker's 2018 book *The Art of Gathering: How We Meet And Why It Matters* has been highly impactful and transformative for me. I was incredibly grateful for the chance to soak in the wisdom of Priya Parker while at the The Episcopal Diocese of Texas clergy conference in October 2021. Her insights on how gatherings can be purposeful and transformative resonated deeply with my own experience of church life. Too often, Parker observes our gatherings—whether meetings, parties, or even family dinners—become bland because we fall back on routine and politeness rather than intentionality. We lose our curiosity and our capacity to be fully present in order to connect with others.

Her central conviction is simple but powerful: gatherings flourish when they are designed around a clear purpose. That purpose should shape how we begin, how we host, and how we end. Parker names three essential practices for life-giving gatherings:

- **Start with purpose.** A gathering should exist not just for the sake of being together, but for something specific and bold.
- **Host with generosity and intention.** The host's role is not neutral; they actively guide, shape, and sometimes even narrow the focus to ensure the purpose is honored.
- **End well.** Strong endings help participants carry forward the meaning of what they've shared, ensuring it lingers beyond the moment.

If Parker were looking for the world's most enduring example of a gathering built on clear purpose, she would need look no further than the Eucharist. Here is a gathering that is not accidental or polite, but purposeful and transformative. At its heart is Christ's own command: "Do this in remembrance of me."

The Eucharist is not simply a meeting of individuals who bring their own reasons for attending; though each of us comes carrying unique joys, burdens, and questions. Rather, the Eucharist is a gathering with a God-given purpose: to renew the Church by uniting us with Jesus Christ in his self-giving love. In this meal, we are healed, formed, forgiven, and strengthened. We do not leave as the same people who arrived.

Here in the Eucharist, Christ is our host—literally. And we all serve as members of that Body. When we gather gratefully—with purpose and intention—we can become instruments of peace, agents of love, and companions in the journey.

And then, like Parker's reminder that endings matter, the Eucharist sends us forth with intention. We are sent forth not to scatter aimlessly, but to live out what we have received. "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." That ending gives shape to everything that came before it.

In Parker's words, gatherings succeed when we are clear about why we meet. The Eucharist draws us into God's saving work and sends us to share it with the world.

So come. Bring your hopes and your anxieties, your families and your work. Gather gratefully. Here, in bread and wine, God takes all that we are and transforms it with love—so that we may be life for the world.

"One, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church"

If you had asked me to draw God as a five-year-old, I probably would have drawn my childhood priest—the Rev. Andrew Merrow. And if you had asked me to draw —I would've drawn the building I attended most Sundays. It wasn't until much later that the words we recite in the Nicene Creed began to sink in.

"We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church."

Church is so much bigger than Grace/la Gracia. Through beliefs and traditions, we are connected across geographical boundaries, denominations, and structures. We are One in the Spirit, and we are One in Christ Jesus our Lord. We share a special connection with the other Episcopal Churches in our region. In the Alexandria Region of the Diocese of Virginia, there are eight Episcopal Churches (Christ Church, Church of St. Clement, Church of the Resurrection, Emmanuel, Grace, Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill, Meade Memorial, St. Paul's) plus the Goodwin Houses and all the Episcopal Schools. Geographically, we are the smallest region in the Diocese, yet we are jam packed with Episcopal communities.

Principles of supply and demand might imply that this puts us in competition with one another. But I don't think that is what Jesus would want for us. No, we are not in competition with the other Episcopal Churches in Alexandria; we are in collaboration. Together we can support each other's ministries and help all our siblings in Christ grow in faith and love.

There are many opportunities to witness this collaboration in action. On October 5 youth from Grace and St. Paul's carved pumpkins together that were purchased from the Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill pumpkin fundraiser (see photo!). On October 19th, youth from all the Alexandria churches will come together for a joint Halloween movie night and graveyard compline. On October 26th, Grace Church and School will partner with Emmanuel for our annual Trunk or Treat. October 31st-November 2nd, youth from around the Diocese will head to Shrine Mont for a high school retreat. November 6th-8th, two high schoolers from Grace, Celia Schultz and Perrin Chiow, will attend Diocesan Convention in Fredericksburg. And November 15th, elementary-aged children from around Northern Virginia will gather for a morning of spiritual formation and play.

If all those opportunities for collaboration are coming up in the next couple months, you can imagine the exciting potential for continued work together. Grace Church may be our church home that we come back to time and time again, but I wonder how we can be leaders for our region and diocese and how we can learn from our neighboring churches to better serve Christ.

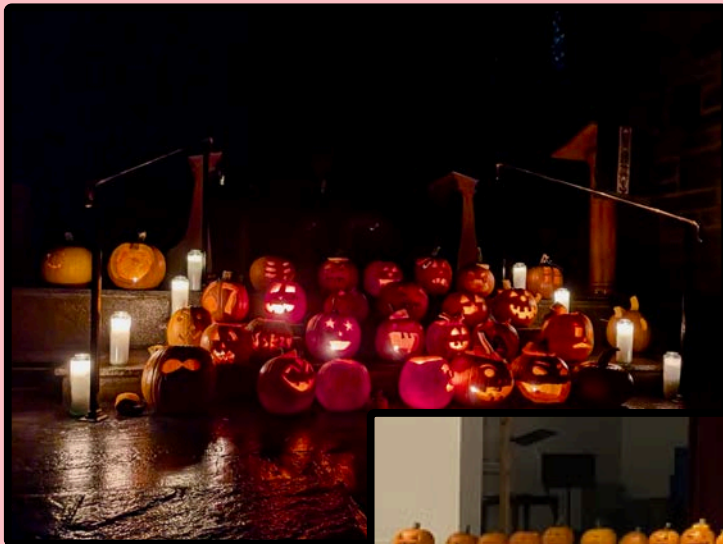
To quote the words of a beloved song from Shrine Mont Camps:

If you have looked at the bulletins over the last couple of weeks, you have probably noticed a plethora of announcements. There are notices about various opportunities to get involved in ministries, take advantage of formation opportunities, form and strengthen relationships through fellowship, and causes for celebrating the many ways that Grace is living out our mission in Alexandria and beyond. With the many ways and purposes for which we gather, it is evident that a lot is going on. With so much activity taking place, our email inboxes are a bit more active in this season.

Unfortunately, we're not the only ones who are busy. Scammers—"bad actors" who send fraudulent emails—are increasingly targeting churches. Since these emails are fraudulent, Clergy and Staff can do little to prevent it from happening. To help keep our community safe, we all must be aware of these scams. Here are a few reminders to help us to identify potential phishing, the term that describes when bad actors impersonate a trustworthy person or organization to commit a cybercrime:

1. Clergy & Staff will email you from their gracealex.org email address. Scammers will often purport to be staff using staff names, but the "from" email address will not be from a gracealex.org address. Remember, it is very easy for someone to find out the names of our clergy and staff and then create email addresses using our names in the email addresses from familiar email providers (like Gmail, Hotmail, etc.). Please note, some more sophisticated scammers can "mask" emails to appear to come from legitimate gracealex.org addresses, so still be cautious, and when in doubt if an email is legitimate, feel free to call the church office.

2. Staff will never ask parishioners for money or gift cards. Church staff will never make a direct request to an individual parishioner for money or to make a direct donation of any kind of gift card. This is a common scam where the bad actor poses as a staff member, often clergy, asking a parishioner to help someone in need by buying gift cards and providing the gift card information. This allows the scammer to access the funds. Any opportunities for people to make a difference by donating to a special project, including gift cards, will be communicated in official church communications and not in individual requests to parishioners.

3. Do not click unknown links. Be sure that you never click on a link from an email address that you do not recognize. When you click on active links, it could allow a scammer to access your personal information and/or potentially download harmful viruses or software to your PC/device.

Remember, if something looks fishy, it could be phishing, so don't take the bait! If something looks off to you about an email stating it is from church staff, you can always reach out to us. We want everyone to feel safe and confident about church communications. By staying alert and following these steps, you'll help protect yourself and our wider Grace community.

I give to Grace online, dividing my pledge into a monthly offering that is sent automatically throughout the year. It helps my family to budget, and brings consistency and predictability to Grace's financial planning. But I miss putting my check into the collection bag. Sometimes I look awkwardly away from the usher, or shake my head no. I feel a little ashamed not to be "participating," and am tempted to blurt "Bank of America sent my money!"

In our pews, you will see tags hanging from clear Command hooks (no pews were harmed!) with the words "Bless my online giving." You are invited to drop one in the offertory bags or alms basin as a way to physically represent the giving you have done. I hope you—your families, children, visitors—will find this action satisfying, and a way to participate even more fully in the blessing.

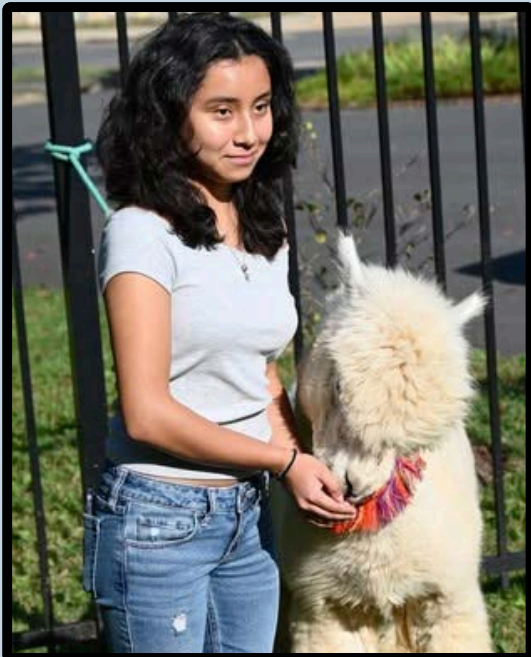
