

THE BURIAL OF THE DEAD

From the Book of Common Prayer

The Liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all its meaning in the Resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we too shall be raised. The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend Lazarus. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

Grant that, increasing in knowledge and love of thee, he may go from strength to strength in the life of perfect service in thy heavenly kingdom. Amen.

Grant us, with all who have died in the hope of the resurrection, to have our consummation and bliss in thy eternal and everlasting glory, and, with all thy saints, to receive the crown of life which thou dost promise to all who share in the victory of thy Son Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Steven Richard Saunders November 11, 1946 - July 5, 2025

Steven Richard Saunders 78, of Alexandria, VA died on July 5, 2025 from cancer. Steve was born November 11, 1946 in Newark, NJ. He grew up in Elmont, L.I. NY, the son of Lawrence Jay Saunders and Sarah Leinoff Saunders. He graduated from Elmont Memorial High School and Washington and Lee University (1968). He married Maureen Collins in 1977.

Steve loved history and politics, and his career reflected that: History teacher at The Lawrenceville School in NJ, Deputy Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay, Legislative Director & Press Secretary to US Rep. N. Lent (NY), Staff Director of the Republican Conference, and Communications Director of the National Republican Senatorial Committee.

One of his favorite jobs was Assistant U.S. Trade Representative. Its focus on Asia would shape the rest of his career. Steve founded Saunders & Co. in 1982, an international business and public policy consulting firm for Pacific Basin countries. At the same time, he opened an art gallery, Perry House Gallery in Alexandria. In 1998, he became President of the U.S.-Mongolia Business Council developing a special relationship with Mongolia's people and their culture. The President of Mongolia awarded Steve the Order of the Polar Star, the highest tribute bestowed on a foreigner. It was Steve's honor to serve the Foreign Ministry of Japan and the Japanese Embassy in Washington, DC for 38 years. His career gave him a life of travel, visiting countries and cultures he fell in love with, especially Japan, China, and Mongolia.

Steve's gift was human connection, making deep friendships all over the world. He had an infectious personality and looked at the bright side, the good in people. He was witty with an excellent sense of humor. He had an unquenchable thirst for knowledge, always reading and researching across multiple disciplines, including politics, trade, religion, and history. He was a great admirer of Teddy Roosevelt, a member of the T.R. Association and briefly wore a Park Ranger hat as Ranger-Historian at Roosevelt's home.

Steve had a diverse collection of Asian & Native American art and enjoyed sharing the stories of his travels and collections. He never lost the teaching bug, mentoring and teaching as he went along, getting the greatest satisfaction from constantly and quietly helping others. He loved the beach, museums, and being home with Maureen and their children.

Steve was beloved as a wonderful Dad, husband, grandfather, and friend. Steve is survived by his wife of 48 years Maureen Collins Saunders, daughters Keira and Erin, son Burke, granddaughter Mia, his mother-in-law, Naomi Collins, many cousins, nieces, nephews, and friends. He was predeceased by his parents and his brother, Robert Saunders.

The funeral service will be held Tuesday, August 26, 2025 at 1 p.m. at Grace Episcopal Church of Alexandria VA, 3601 Russell Rd., Alexandria, VA 22305. A reception, a Celebration of Steve's Life will be held immediately after the funeral. Details for the Celebration Reception will be provided later.

Today, we honor the memory and legacy of Steve Saunders, a visionary leader and a dear friend. From the earliest days of Mongolia's democratic transition, Steve believed deeply in our nation's future. In the early 1990s, he was among the first Americans to champion business, education, and political ties with Mongolia, helping lay the foundation for a strong market economy and a lasting partnership between our peoples.

Steve first came to Mongolia in the 1990s as one of the pioneering political development advisors with the International Republican Institute, just as Mongolia was taking its first bold steps toward multiparty democracy. He recognized early on that Mongolia's success would depend on political reform and strengthening international economic ties. As president of the North America–Mongolia Business Council (NAMBC), Steve became a tireless advocate for trade, investment, and policy dialogue.

He believed in the potential of U.S.-Mongolia relations and what we now call "Third Neighbor" cooperation. Under his leadership, NAMBC became more than a business platform, it became a vital bridge for greater understanding between our peoples. Steve's message was consistent and clear: Mongolia matters, and Mongolia is ready, whether in Ulaanbaatar boardrooms, at investor forums, or in a herder's ger in the countryside.

Steve's dedication to our democratic journey never faltered. He encouraged American businesses and institutions to see opportunity and recognize Mongolia as a country of shared values worthy of trust and long-term commitment. His advocacy was always grounded in respect, friendship, and a belief that we could build together in the future.

He was more than a leader. He was a mentor, a tireless bridge-builder, and a steadfast believer in Mongolia's promise. I will always be grateful for his friendship, wisdom, and unwavering support. In recognition of his many contributions, he was awarded the Order of the Polar Star—our highest honor for a foreign friend.

We offer our deepest condolences to Steve's family, friends, and colleagues. His work lives on in the enduring partnerships he helped shape and the lives he touched. Of all his remarkable qualities, perhaps the greatest was his ability to bring people from vastly different backgrounds closer together.

That was Steve's true gift, one we must now carry forward.
